So, after sort of deciding the lifestyle that I wanted to have, I'm actually really surprised at how much I'm going to need to pay annually. Federal Taxes and Annual Expenses were the two things that used the most money and I think it's a bit ridiculous. The overall Annual salary that I'll need to have if I want this lifestyle is \$46,887.00. Considering that I really want to have a nice and decent little life, I guess I'm going to need to work a lot. This means that I need a job that will pay me well, but that I can enjoy at the same time. There are twenty different careers in health science that provide more or less of the salary that I need, but there are two that interest me the most.
